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LENTEN SERMON SERIES

Many Christians make the sign of the cross in worship and in prayer. The cross is a fashion accessory, seen as earrings and dangling on necklaces. It can be found in almost every Christian sanctuary. The crucifix with a dying Jesus is found in some churches and an empty cross is found in others. An enormous, beaten, wooden cross hangs from the ceiling in the sanctuary at the last church I served and a pretty brass cross that sometimes needs polishing sits at front of our sanctuary. There is a beautiful wooden cross in Kirk Hall that was built by Buster Jones and Ralph Baker. Other beautiful cross mosaics that Fenton Childers helped our children create are upstairs. Obviously, the cross as a symbol is central to traditional Christian identity.

You may be surprised to learn that the cross did not become a central symbol of the church until the fourth century. Some might say that it never should have become such an important symbol. When they say this, they usually are reacting to some theological interpretation of the cross that isn't preached at Second Presbyterian Church. What cannot be missed, however, is that in the Gospels and in the writings of Paul, the crucifixion is central to understanding the significance of Jesus. There is a good reason Paul said, "We preach Christ, and him crucified."



Presbyterians for Earth Care: A Brief History

(The following was excerpted from https://presbyearthcare.org/history/)

In 1990, the 202nd General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) adopted by a 97% majority the policy report "Restoring Creation for Ecology and Justice." It calls Presbyterians to focus on caring for creation as a central concern, to be incorporated into the life and mission of the church at every level.

Five years later, a number of Presbyterians, restless to see the policy enacted in the national church, founded Presbyterians for Restoring Creation (PRC), a national, grassroots organization to support people of faith working towards "environmental wholeness with social justice." In 2005, PRC became known as **Presbyterian for Earth Care (PEC).** For over twenty five years, PEC has helped the church to fulfill its current environmental policies, create new environmentally responsible policies and practices, and equip and educate Presbyterians about earth care ministry.

"We live in a time of wide-spread...destruction of the natural world and human communities. Our faith compels us to respond. Empowered by our rich biblical and theological heritage:

- loving, and joyful participation in caring for the fullness of that creation.
- reign calls us to witness boldly as servants and prophets to our age."

Going into 2023, Presbyterians for Earth Care begins its 26th year of earth care advocacy and witness. "There is great urgency to the work before us. Our hope rests fully in the One who continues to create, redeem, and sustain us all. May we be faithful to the call."

The cyclical rhythm of the church year can be a welcome reminder of the passage of time and God's hand in it. Lent, like Advent, is a time of waiting and preparation. Only, unlike Advent, we're waiting not for Jesus' arrival but for his death and resurrection. Generally, the season is a time of reflection and introspection as we evaluate our lives in the light of who Christ is and what he has called us to be. Many years ago, we named a Lenten practice of evening worship "Kairos." This ancient Greek word describes finding "the right or opportune moment." Kairos has been used over the centuries to describe time for spiritual reflection, and even, to put it simply, "God's time."

This spring, the church is offering a "blended" experience for Kairos Lenten worship, with opportunities for worship in person and online. God's time, really, can be anytime. We pray that this Lenten practice may be welcome time of quiet, reflection, and connection to the Holy in the midst of this changing season.
