Serving one congregation for a quarter of a century was not something I imagined I would do when I went to seminary and accepted my first call. There was so much that I was told by others that I naively assumed to be true which spoke against such a long term pastorate.

I was told, "Any pastor that follows another long-term pastor is going to be an 'Unintentional Interim.' That has not been true for me following Bill Klein, or Bill following Hayden Hollingsworth, or Hayden following Spencer Edmunds, or Spencer following Arthur Rowbotham.

I was told, "The previous Senior Minister needs to move away, or you'll never be accepted as the new Senior Minister." That was not the case with Bill Klein remaining a part of the congregation, for he was a great support and a wonderful friend.

I was told, "A pastor shouldn't stay longer than a decade because a church will not evolve without new leadership." That has not been true with Second Presbyterian Church which has continued to adapt and evolve over the years. It has also been a church that draws on the leadership of other ministers who do not have the "Senior" position so as to remain fresh; ministers like Elizabeth Link and Ben Brannan.

Those three things which have been said have been true at certain other churches.

LENT 2023**

The cyclical rhythm of the church year can be a welcome reminder of the passage of time and God's hand in it. Lent, like Advent, is a time of waiting and preparation. Only, unlike Advent, we're waiting not for Jesus' arrival but for his death and resurrection. Generally, the season is a time of reflection and introspection as we evaluate our lives in the light of who Christ is and what he has called us to be. Many years ago, we named a Lenten practice of evening worship "Kairos." This ancient Greek word describes finding "the right or opportune moment." Kairos has been used over the centuries to describe time for spiritual reflection, and even, to put it simply, "God's time."

LEGACY CORNER

Second Presbyterian is fortunate to have a number of endowments to enhance the mission of the church. One of the lesser known funds is the endowment for our preschool program. Our preschool program began in the fall of 1953 and is about to celebrate its seventieth anniversary. It is the second oldest formal preschool program in Roanoke and it serves Almost 100 children ages 3 months to 5 years old.

The preschool provides a place where young children socialize and learn basic skills in a Christian environment. Many of the students are children of this church. It has always been considered one of the best preschools in Roanoke with a dedicated staff. It is also a way of attracting young couples to the church. When my wife and I were considering joining the church we were impressed with the preschool program and knew that children of the church were given priority in the admission process.

The preschool endowment was established to help the preschool continue its mission into the future. Income from the endowment will provide scholarships. Funds will provide support for programs, classrooms, and staff. In addition, it will help upgrade and enhance the preschool facilities. Recently, funds from the endowment were used to provide an outside door to be an additional emergency exit for the preschool area.

Sustainability Spotlight



Reduce Waste

“There is no such thing as waste. Waste is just a resource in the wrong place.”

The Green Team submitted an Observations and Recommendations Report to the church last June in order to reduce, reuse, and recycle all aspects of waste generated by the church. Reducing, reusing, and recycling is an excellent means to lessen the amount of waste generated and the amount of waste going into the landfill. The church generates approximately 20 tons of waste annually that goes into the landfill. This is equivalent to emitting 7.5 tons of CO₂. One of the Green Team’s 2023 priorities is to work with administrative staff, custodial staff, and preschool staff to develop a comprehensive and coordinated plan to reduce waste and reuse and recycle waste materials. Church and community benefits are numerous:

- Lowering the church’s carbon emissions;
- Minimizing the cost of waste removal;
- Reducing the use of natural resources;
- Lessening the amount of material going into the landfill;
- Energy savings resulting from products manufactured from recycled materials such as paper cardboard, glass, metal, and plastic vs. using products manufactured from raw materials.

Why is Reducing Waste Important?

“Natural resources are being depleted and landfills are being filled at an increasing rate. Our current system of production, consumption and disposal has become unsustainable. It is imperative for everyone - from individuals to large organizations to rethink our ideas and our relationship to trash disposal. By reducing the amount of trash produced and reusing existing materials, we can all make a difference by protecting the environment, conserving natural resources, and sustaining the planet for future generations.”

It is our hope that as more waste material is recycled, there will be less of a need for the dumpster located in the Mountain Ave. parking lot. If the church can reduce, reuse, and recycle enough waste to eliminate the need for the dumpster, and rely solely on the City of Roanoke Solid Waste and Recycling green and blue bins, the church will be able to save the \$2,340 dumpster fee and eliminate a neighborhood eyesore.
