

LENTEN SERMON SERIES: FOLLOWING

With Ash Wednesday on February 14, Lent begins earlier than usual this year. Our church's mission statement is "Finding direction by following Jesus," so it is right for us to consider what that means. We will remember some in the Bible who were faithful in their following, though not always perfect. With Lent a season to consider and confess our sins, we also will remember some who followed Jesus only to abandon him, betray him, or bring him down.

Formulas at a church in Paducah, Kentucky. With the ways some are "deconstructing" faith and church in mind, I consider doctrines frequently criticized these days like original sin, atonement, and the authority of scripture. I will suggest that these doctrines are made easy targets for critique when they are turned into formulas and their truthfulness is turned into truth, and their memorization becomes a means of salvation. If you want to find out what I mean by that, or if you simply want to help me prepare for my series in Paducah, join me during the noon hour on March 6, 13 and 27 (I will be out of town March 20).

MIDWEEK STUDY: THE BIBLE IN BLACK & WHITE

During the noon hour on Wednesdays in April, Bill Lee and I will lead another class where people of predominately white and black neighborhoods will join together for study and conversation. The focus of our study together will be Walter Brueggemann's *Delivered into Covenant: Pivotal Moments in the Book of Exodus*. This book is the companion of *Delivered Out of Empire*, which we studied in the fall.

A couple of other churches are considering joining us for this class.

DEDICATION OF ALEXA HOUSE

Mother's Day is in part about nurture and providing a home. On Mother's Day, May 12, we will dedicate *Alexa House* for its role in providing a safe, temporary home to families in housing crisis. This worship service will be an opportunity for our church, for all the faith communities that support *Family Promise*, and for the larger community to respond to real and potential tragedy with faith, hope and love.

The service will take place at 5:00 p.m. Alexa House will be open to the public before and after the service.

You can see that we have impactful opportunities for worship and reflection coming in the spring. We hope you will plan in advance to take advantage of them.

"From Daughters to Disciples: Women's Stories from the New Testament" by Lynn Japinga



Just as often, the female characters of the Bible are simply ignored. However, the women of the Bible are complex, multidimensional individuals whose lives are inspiring, funny, and tragic in ways too many of us never hear.

In From Daughters to Disciples, author Lynn Japinga acquaints us with the women of the New Testament. From faithful forerunners like Anna and Elizabeth to female disciples like the sisters Mary, Martha, and Mary Magdalene to first-generation followers like Lydia and Dorcas, we will encounter a wealth of foremothers in the faith in all their messy, yet redeemable, humanity.

KAIROS: LENT 2024

The cyclical rhythm of the church year can be a welcome reminder of the passage of time and God's hand in it. Lent, like Advent, is a time of waiting and preparation. Only, unlike Advent, we're waiting not for Jesus' arrival but for his death and resurrection. Generally, the season is a time of reflection and introspection as we evaluate our lives in the light of who Christ is and who he has called us to be. Many years ago, we named a Lenten practice of evening worship "Kairos." This ancient Greek word describes finding "the right or opportune moment." *Kairos* has been used over the centuries to describe time for spiritual reflection, and even, to put it simply, "God's time."

This spring, the church is offering a "blended" experience for Kairos Lenten worship, with opportunities for worship in person and online. God's time, really, can be anytime. We pray that this Lenten practice may be welcome time of quiet, reflection, and connection to the Holy in the midst of this changing season.

LEGACY CORNER

Second Presbyterian Church has been blessed by the establishment of numerous legacy funds or endowments. These funds contribute to the work of the church both now and into the future. Nothing better illustrates the continuing work of the legacy funds than the Johnson Fund which was discussed in last month's Legacy Corner. The fund was established in 1959, and today it is giving financial assistance to a seminary student who is connected to the church. Several of the funds have been established by the gifts and bequests of members of this church. Establishing a new fund requires a gift of at least \$50,000. Unfortunately, a number of members believe to contribute to the future of the church requires the financial ability to establish a new fund. That is not so. A gift of any size can be made to any of the legacy funds, and each gift helps continue the work of the church.

Our largest fund is the Second Fund which has helped both the church and the community since 1984. Over the years, it has allowed the church to accomplish things that could not have been done from the church's day to day budget. It is not named for one individual because there is not one individual who established the fund. The Second Fund came about because a large number of members made gifts of different sizes.

There are eleven legacy funds. Each has a different purpose from charitable work in the community to caring for the church's heating and air conditioning systems. A gift of any size to the funds will perpetuate the church and its mission into the future.

CLIMATE CHANGE: WHAT'S CHRISTIANITY GOT TO DO WITH IT? A CHRISTIAN CLIMATE SCIENTIST EXPLAINS

Come and join us as the Green Team hosts a POP-UP Sunday School on Sunday, March 3, 2024.

Join us as **Dr. Katharine Hayhoe**, renowned Christian climate scientist, explains how *Grounded by Scripture* and *Informed by Science*, she's *Finding Direction by Following Jesus* when it comes to talking about climate change. We will be watching a talk she gave at the Brigham Young University Forum on November 29, 2022 entitled "Loving All God's Creation."

Dr. Hayhoe is Chief Scientist at The Nature Conservancy. She has been named a United Nations Champion of the Earth, the World Evangelical Alliance's Climate Ambassador, and one of *TIME*'s 100 Most Influential People. Did You Know?

Second Presbyterian has been a longstanding financial partner with Habitat, and our giving amount was right at the threshold for a full-sponsor build. We increased our benevolence to Habitat, and by partnering with St. John's, we have been able to co-sponsor the second largest home Habitat has built in Roanoke—roughly 2,700 square feet. The Mussa Family is a family of 9, with children aged two to fifteen years old, and they are overjoyed to begin building their home with us, as well as building a relationship with us. The Mussa family is one of the largest families to ever qualify for a Habitat home. Both Mussa and his wife are naturalized citizens and first generation immigrants. Mussa hails from Somalia; his wife is from Kenya—both in Eastern Africa. The Mussa Family Home will be the 270th home that Habitat has built in the area.
