THOUGHTS ON AFFORDABLE HOUSING

We have offerings of Lenten worship and education that is as full as any year I can remember. From a sermon series called "Following," to online devotionals called "Home Videos," to mid-week classes like "Faith Without Formulas" and "The Bible in Black and White," we have an abundance of opportunities to reflect on our life with Christ. I wrote about them in the February Second Sheet, so I won't go over them again.

I will say that the theme of home and homelessness is a focus not only of our online devotions but also of our church. This is the year we join with St. John's Episcopal Church to build a Habitat house and we dedicate *Alexa House* for its primary use of hosting families in housing crisis.

Our timing is good because the Roanoke region has a growing affordable housing problem. Part of the problem is national. The pandemic pulled people into their homes. Housing prices went up as well as the cost of new construction and renovation. Some properties are kept off the market for short term rentals (Airbnb and VRBO for instance). This new phenomenon in middle to upper income neighborhoods is joined with properties kept off the market in low-income neighborhoods by landlords who won't keep them up while collecting rent from those who can't find another place to

live.

Another reason for the growing problem is local. According to the Roanoke Regional Partnership, our region has had the highest job growth rate in 30 years which, of course, leads to fewer available properties and higher prices. Have you peeked recently at the Zillow estimate for housing in your neighborhood?

Affordable housing is hard to define. A common rule of thumb is that housing costs, to be affordable, should be within 30% of one's income. This measure is far from perfect because 30% of a high income can be easily affordable, and 30% of a low income can be unrealistic when health care coverage can cost, on average, 33.9% of that person's income [1] No one can reasonably think that a third of an income for housing is realistic for a low income family that already has to pay over a third of its income for health care. Nevertheless, using that measure, the difficulty of purchasing or renting a place to live and staying within 30% of one's income is becoming difficult for an increasingly higher percentage of the population.

I am glad to say that there are people in public, business and private sectors in the Roanoke region who recognize affordable housing as an issue that needs to be addressed proactively. As the city continues to prosper economically, they know that ways need to be found to "bake in" affordable housing so that those with lower incomes can afford housing within an acceptable distance of where they work. We, who live in this region, should encourage efforts to help make sure that Roanoke isn't only for the high-income community.

As a Christ-centered community of faith, Second Presbyterian Church is called to do its part to help by focusing on efforts to improve affordable housing for the poor. Our support for organizations like the Rescue Mission, Habitat for Humanity, and Family Promise is strong. Because of the generosity of our members this past stewardship season, our Service and Outreach Committee is exploring other ways our church can make a greater difference as early as this next fiscal year.

SPEAKING OF WHICH...

You may have read that the congregation of *Trinity United Methodist Church* has merged with *Greene Memorial United Methodist Church*. The buildings that housed the Trinity congregation will be renovated by the nonprofit organization, *Restoration Housing* (www.restorationhousing.org), to become affordable housing for elderly residents. *Restoration Housing* will not only do the work of renovation but will provide ongoing maintenance. This is the sort of innovative solution to affordable housing that is needed.

The world the apostle Paul inhabited was dramatically different from our time. He knew nothing of capitalism, or physics, or Zoom, and more significantly, Paul was a regular in Caesar's prison. For us, "Caesar" is a salad. But a constant in the human story is that every life faces suffering. Paul's life was no different. And yet, on Paul's worst days, he still exhibited a spirit of joy. In this spirit of joy, Paul offers us some inspiration. Joy is not a common reality in modern life. We are more acquainted with anxiety and fear, and on good days we can settle for happiness; but joy is less common. The worst days come to all of us. At some

point the dreams die, the body fails, the spirit is crushed. Those days leave their mark on us. But an imprisoned apostle passed down 104 verses to an ancient congregation in Philippi, and they have passed it down to us. It is their testimony that when the worst days come—and they will—they do not have to be the end of joy. Indeed, they might be the beginning.

CREATE, CHOOSE PEACE, FIND JOY, DEEPEN FAITH: GALS' GATHERING REFLECTION

Winter Garden was the theme of our Gals' Gathering women's retreat this year. It seems a bit of an oxymoron to think of the snow we have on the ground as a stark contrast to the fresh, vibrant green and beautiful flowers of a garden. Our focus, however, was on the roots that might be hidden and quiet. Roots that are gathering strength in that darkness for the growth that is to come.

As we were asked to consider why we had joined in retreat, the answers were clear and unanimous—connection, friendship, to be refreshed, filled up, renewed. Next, we were asked who we are—mom, sister, grandmother, gardener, mediator, dog lover, scheduler. The Rev. Rachel Vogado, our fantastic speaker, guided us through listening and conversing about the quiet times in our lives, strengthening our roots, defining our roots, and the importance of ordinary time in our church calendar.

The scripture for our day together was Colossians 2:6-7. Paul is writing to the Colossians at a time in their church when they were tying themselves in knots to be perfect Christians. Here is The Message translation:

"My counsel for you is simple and straightforward: Just go ahead with what you've been given. You received Christ Jesus, the Master: now live in him. You're deeply rooted in him. You're well constructed upon him. You know your way around the faith. Now do what you've been taught. School's out: quit studying the subject and start living it! And let your living spill over into thanksgiving."

Upon contemplation at our tables and during a walking meditation of looking for the verbs in the scripture, we were asked, "What stands out as a message to you?" The messages came—receiving/as a newborn in a receiving blanket, abounding/spilling over with thanksgiving, roots/taught/history/fortified foundation, we have all that we need. Rachel reminded us that our muscles get stronger when challenged and stretched. So, too, must our faith be in action, our roots deepened in study/contemplation. If we are filled with thankfulness, not running on empty, then the overflowing abundance of that joy is how we serve and listen to others. In sharing that gratitude, we nurture intimacy with others and invite deeper connections.

Fellowship, crafting, and food are the traditions of our time together as women of the church here at Second Presbyterian, and this year did not disappoint. The traditional food such as cinnamon rolls, cookies, and whiskey sticks were joined with healthier gluten free options to balance out our New Year's resolutions. The spaces in our church were lovingly transformed with beautiful decorations to make our time more special and celebratory. Crafts abounded as well as a Pilates session from Ashley Beamer to stretch our bodies. There was truly something for everyone to connect and enjoy fellowship together.

To close our day, we again came together for worship and communion. Rachel again spoke on Colossians, this time using 3:12-17 NIV:

"Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity. Let the piece of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus giving thanks to God the Father through him."

The message to us is to create, choose the peace of Christ over anxiety, find joy in the midst of sorrow and deepen our faith rather than giving in to fear. Rachel encouraged us to strengthen our roots to prepare for the coming growing season with rest, prayer, contemplation of scripture and abundant thanksgiving that might overflow to all around us and open more connection. We as Christians are given HOPE through Christ which leads to a life of faith in that hope. This is a hope that cannot be contained and leads to living in overflowing thanksgiving. Christians live in abundance, not scarcity. Hallelujah!

Many thanks to all who worked to prepare our retreat; your love and care were felt and appreciated by all. If you missed our retreat this year, I invite you to join in this special time next year. For me, it is a treasured time for renewal that is not to be missed.

COMPOSTING

A VIRGINIAN'S DREAM TO MINIMIZE WASTE AND EMISSIONS BECAME A REALITY IN JANUARY WITH THE OPENING OF STAR CITY COMPOST, ROANOKE'S FIRST COMPOSTING FACILITY.

You probably already engage in some form of recycling through participation in taxpayer supported municipal services when it comes to paper, metal, glass, and some types of plastic. However, have you ever thought about recycling (composting) your organic food waste—waste that winds up in the landfill and releases huge amounts of methane gas—a potent greenhouse gas that is 28-36 times more effective than carbon dioxide at trapping heat in the atmosphere over a 100-year period?^[1]

What is composting you ask? The U.S. Environmental Protections Agency (EPA) defines composting as, "The process of converting organic materials into nutrient-rich, biologically stable soil or mulch through the natural process of decomposition."

Currently, the City of Roanoke does not offer any curbside organics collection. But let's be honest. How many of us want to compost in our own backyards. It's messy, requires maintenance, potentially attracts unwanted critters, and generates an unpleasant odor. Fortunately, there is an alternative. It's called Star City Compost.

"We're giving people a real tangible option to reduce their waste and lower their carbon footprint—that goes for residents and commercial entities in the area," Stewards said. "You can make an impact on climate change for the same cost of a Netflix subscription—it's possible for us to achieve as a society, we just have to want to do it."
