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PASTOR'S NOTES - DR. GEORGE C. ANDERSON

I love the Olympics. I watched the Summer Olympics as much as I could this summer. That wasn't much the first week because I was busy working. The second week, however, I took a week-long vacation to visit my sister in Colorado, play pickleball, and watch as much of the Olympic events as I could without being rude. While I missed so much of what I would have enjoyed seeing, I did enjoy a great deal. I missed the closing ceremonies, but the opening ceremonies were amazing. I saw the "Pommel Horse Guy," having solved the Rubik's cube within 10 seconds earlier that day, take off his glasses to do the one thing he was brought to Paris to do, perform a routine on the pommel horse. He rose to the occasion, nailed the routine, and was rushed by his teammates who were so enthusiastic in their celebration that he had a hard time pushing his "Clark Kent" glasses back on. I saw the USA men's beach volleyball team lose a huge lead despite excellent play. I saw so many races in the pool and on the track that I lost count. I saw Gabby Thomas win a gold medal for sprinting, and learned the story of someone who got her Harvard undergraduate degree in neurobiology and global health, a masters in epidemiology, and who now works at a Volunteer Health Care Clinic for folks without insurance. Curry's final three pointer that won a gold medal for the USA in men's basketball.

The Olympics is special because it is always about stories. I would rather be outdoors and enjoying nature than watch a sporting event where I know nothing about who is competing and what has led up to this match. I need to know something about the participants... the teams. It is within the context of intersecting stories that makes the drama of the event so interesting.

That is how it is with life in general. What makes life fascinating is the intersection of stories within history. The intersection of stories is also what makes being a Christian so interesting. Ask me what my being a Christian meant back at the beginning of this century, and I'll remember stories. I will tell you about traveling to West Virginia with four other people to learn how to lead a DISCIPLE Bible Study. I'll tell you about a woman elder in the church who remained so faithful and positive despite her family's stories about mental health struggles. I would tell about teaching well attended Wednesday night classes with my predecessor. I would tell you about who were the brave and visionary leaders of the first instances of what have now become church traditions such as the DR Mission Trip, the Churchwide Retreat, Evening Bible School, the Church Picnic out at Al and Nancy Hammond's place... I would tell you about people now dead who were then our congregation's greatest leaders.

The stories of Second Presbyterian Church also intersect with the stories of our community and nation, today and in the past. I find who I am as someone trying to follow Jesus with others at Second in relation to stories about Roanoke city and the valley, Union and Massanetta, this country and countries like the Dominican Republic. We find our story intersects with stories about Israel, Greece, and Rome; and modern stories about democracy, world relations and world wars. Within the context of all these intersecting stories, I find my place in life and among you as someone trying to know and serve God.

In the coming school year, we will offer a wide variety of programs of worship, education, fellowship and service. Within the ways we study, worship and serve together, our stories become intertwined. Because knowing and following Jesus is our shared agenda, Jesus' story will find a way to be retold in the world.

Let's commit to being involved in the church to know better our place in the world, and perhaps bless the world in the way Jesus continues to tell his story through us.

The email will be sent by a church staff member at notifications@onrealmmail.org. Please add this email address to your contacts to help ensure email delivery to your inbox, not spam. Emails from this address are legitimate and trustworthy.

On Sundays, September 8 and 15, photo stations will be set up in the passageway outside the sanctuary for those who want to use a church photo for their directory profile (you may also upload your own photo).

Realm will function as our new online Church Directory. We want Realm to be THE place to find contact information. We need your help by setting your privacy settings and keeping your contact information accurate. The directory only works if everyone logs on, updates their contact information, and opts-in to the directory by unlocking their privacy settings. *If you do not opt-in, your information will not be visible to other church members.* We are suggesting that you share your contact information as you would in a printed directory. The directory will be made available as soon as we gather all the information.

READING GENESIS



In Reading Genesis, Marilynne Robinson insists that modern readers have largely misunderstood the literary and theological significance of the Bible. Among the most salient causes of this misunderstanding, she argues, is our tendency to read ancient texts through modern categories—history, myth, fiction, nonfiction—that do not map neatly onto ancient literature. The result is a never-ending and mostly unnecessary debate between those who approach Genesis as a catalog of events and those who read it as mythic pastiche, pieced together from various ancient sources. The goal of Genesis, in her estimation, is not to offer a play-by-play of primeval events but to give a theological account of who God is, who we are, and how we should live together in light of that theology. While England was experiencing its great test of character during the German Blitz



in the summer of 1940, C.S. Lewis began crafting 31 letters from a senior tempter in Hell named Screwtape to his underling nephew Wormwood, with the hope that these letters could provide "reverse" encouragement and hope during those uncertain and scary times. These letters were initially released weekly in a local paper, but we know them today as *The Screwtape Letters*. During our fall Men's Bible Study, Carter Brothers will lead our discussion of the timeliness of Lewis' great satirical work during our own uncertain and scary time and the key to unpacking its messages of hope and encouragement to us in 2024. 

For in the end, following Jesus, at its best, unites us rather than divides us. And therein lies the true joy.


Last fall, the Green Team hosted a Sunday school class entitled *Christianity and Climate Change*. The class was based on a film series featuring Katharine Hayhoe, the internationally renowned Christian climate scientist. In each episode, she responded to climate questions from key church leaders and members from across Scotland. Class discussion followed each video exploring how people of all faiths, and we as Christians, think, feel, and talk about caring for the planet, loving our neighbor, and preparing for a changing climate.

Dr. Hayhoe shares her faith on climate change as follows,

"For Christians, doing something about climate change is about living out our faith...caring for those who need help and taking responsibility for this planet that God created and entrusted to us. My faith tells me that God does want people to understand climate change and do something about it."

and our own Presbytery of the Peaks states,

"As a faith community, we can be a model to the larger community and a witness to the faith we profess by taking visible concrete actions that express what we believe about creation and our role in caring for it."



Although the Green Team is not offering a class this fall, Kyle Meyaard-Schaap's book Following Jesus in a Warming World: A Christian Call to Climate Action published in 2023 by InterVarsity Press could be the basis for a future class.

Described as "a field guide for Christian climate action—one grounded not in a sense of guilt or drudgery, but in the joy of caring for creation," this book calls Christians to a deeper understanding of discipleship and witness. Following Jesus in a Warming World: A Christian Call to Climate Action invites readers to reconsider and expand our understanding of evangelism and what it truly means to spread the Good News in light of the climate crisis. For many of us, especially young people who yearn to feel seen and understood in their faithful advocacy, this book bears witness to the urgency of the climate crisis and affirms the Christian call to climate action.

If you have been following the news, then you know, according to NOAA, that July 2024 was the warmest July on record globally for land and ocean temperatures in the last 175 year record. And also, that July 2024 marked the 14th consecutive month of record-high global temperatures.¹
