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PASTOR'S NOTES - DR. GEORGE C. ANDERSON_

WHEN SECOND PRESBYTERIAN GREW UP

I write this Pastor's Note at the close of 2024 for a Second Sheet to be published at the beginning of 2025 and it has put me in a reflective mood. I want to look back past 2024 to a minister none of us know, but whose impact on the church's identity and ministry endures.

Dr. Arthur Rowbotham served as Second Presbyterian's minister from 1901 to 1921. When I arrived at Second, all I heard about him was that he spoke with a Scottish brogue. Yet he deserves to be remembered for much more. In fact, I believe that he brought our congregation into maturity, particularly in shaping our identity as a congregation that prioritizes both worship and outreach.

Form influences function, and church architecture shapes worship. Our present-day sanctuary, constructed during his tenure, shapes worship to this day. Rowbotham was deeply involved in the details of its construction—even personally selecting stones from the quarry for its walls. Designed as a lecture-hall-style space with an elevated pulpit, the sanctuary evokes awe and prayer while emphasizing the centrality of preaching. Later ministers would add an equal emphasis on music and liturgy, but the foundation of our worship identity was laid during Rowbotham's time.

While worship is as important as outreach, I want to spend more time on outreach because it is a fascinating story. Rowbotham brought outreach into the heart of the session's work, beginning with his example as the church's informal mis-

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sionary. He conducted Sunday evening services for jail inmates and for blue-collar workers of the Norfolk and Western shops who were unable to attend morning worship. During World War I, he even took a two-year leave of absence to serve as a chaplain in Army YMCA camps.

Then, in his formal role as moderator of the session, Rowbotham further made outreach a session priority. Today, we take for granted that outreach ministries are included in the church budget, but this was not the case before 1911. After all, Second Presbyterian had only recently transitioned from being a mission project of First Presbyterian Church.

Benevolences were brought into the church budget in this way: Rowbotham established a separate fund to support Annie R. V. Wilson, a missionary to China. While visionary, this initiative brought administrative challenges. Tracking the finances of this fund became a huge headache for the session because the fiscal year of the fund and the fiscal year of the church did not match up. Friction developed between the session and Rowbotham over when to send money and how much money was to be sent. The session came close to discontinuing support for Ms. Wilson and reminding the pastor to focus on preaching, teaching and pastoral care while leaving the financial work of the church to others.

However, a more positive outcome came from the tension, and a new direction for the church was set. The session incorporated missionary support and other benevolent causes into the church budget, with the expressed hope of doubling outreach contributions. They were wrong. Benevolences tripled.

If time travel were possible, it would be fun to bring Dr. Rowbotham to our present day so he could see how outreach ministry has grown. The "builder" in him would surely smile at how our church has helped construct Habitat homes, a Dominican hospital, and Alexa House; and is helping to build a new facility for the Presbyterian Community Center and a study center at Union Presbyterian Seminary. The "missionary" in him would rejoice at seeing so many members giving their time to helping others. And the "moderator" in him would be driven to his knees in gratitude for the hundreds of thousands of dollars flowing annually from our budget and restricted funds to support outreach.

There is one more aspect of Dr. Rowbotham's legacy that might warm his heart. The spirit of collaboration between himself and the session—working through tensions to achieve a greater good—continues to define Second Presbyterian. Our spiritual gift as a politically diverse congregation lies in transcending societal debates and disagreements to find the common ground needed to pursue justice, grace, and transformation in Christ's name.

Dr. Rowbotham would undoubtedly thank God for what has developed, and we should, too. At the same time, we can appreciate what this Scots pastor did as God's agent in helping a congregation mature into a church known for its worship and outreach. We will

honor his legacy by continuing to be a church that offers heartfelt worship of God and heartfelt ministry to others.

Over the past 36 months, the **Spotlight** has reported on many issues regarding the church's progress and ways that, as a faith community, the congregation can participate in realizing a better future. The quote below from a 2022 Presbytery of the Peaks Earth Care Workshop, attended by several Green Team members, captures the essence of what the Green Team and **Sustainability Spotlight** have been attempting to encourage at Second.

"As a faith community, we can be a model to the larger community and a witness to the faith we profess by taking visible concrete actions that express what we believe about creation and our role in caring for it."

Specifically, the Green Team's mission is:

- · making church buildings as energy efficient, sustainable, and carbon-free as possible;
- embracing creation care as central to the life and mission of Second; and
- encouraging similar practices in members' homes, workplaces, and communities.

Looking Ahead:

Spotlights will be identified as January-February, March-April, etc. The Green Team is grateful for this opportunity to continue its practice of serving and sharing.


UPCOMING POP-UP SUNDAY SCHOOL DATES

In discussing Evolution & Faith, Dick will discuss how science and religious philosoprofoundly important to the other, and how survival traits and evolution itself are us to think about: 'who am I/we?' and 'where are we going?' from both our scientif-

For anyone wanting to see more, Dick will follow parts of his book, *Evolution of Caring*, published in 2018 and available on Kindle.



Richard L. Guerrant, M.D. is the Thomas H. Hunter Professor Emeritus of International Medicine in the Division of Infectious Diseases and International Medicine at University of Virginia and is Founding Director of its Center for Global Health Equity, one of the first Trans-University Centers for Global Health. He was elected to the IOM/ National Academy of Medicine and formerly chaired its Board on Global Health.

Guerrant has worked in the Congo, Bangladesh, and Brazil and has his B.S. from Davidson College, his M.D. from the University of Virginia, and his residency in medicine at the Harvard Medical Service/Boston City Hospital. He has held fellowships in Infectious Diseases at NIH, Johns Hopkins, and UVA. Dr. Guerrant edits the major text-book on Tropical Infectious Diseases, among 10 other books, and is author of over 730 scientific articles (18 with UVA's 3 Nobel Laureates) and reviews. His work focuses on enteric infections and their long-term consequences for child growth and cognitive development. He and his colleagues in Brazil also discovered the potential benefits of the major recognized Alzheimer's Disease risk gene, APOE4 that likely contributed to its evolution. He is past president of the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene and recipient of its Walter Reed Medal. He founded one of the nation's first Trans-University Centers for Global Health at UVA and is recipient the Mentor Award of IDSA (2009), of the University's Distinguished Scientist Award (2009) and of its highest honor, the Thomas Jefferson Award in 2010, and was Outstanding Scientist of Virginia in 2012. Elected to the Institute of Medicine/National Academy of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences, Guerrant chaired its Board on Global Health. Among his latest books are Evolution of Evolution: The Survival Value of Caring and Why Care?and How?
