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PASTOR'S NOTES - DR. GEORGE C. ANDERSON

DRAWING FROM THE HISTORY WELL

The Pastor's Note for the January edition of *The Second Sheet* was a historical piece in which I looked back on how Second Presbyterian Church came into maturity under the transformative ministry of Dr. Arthur Rowbotham. That article was well received, so I thought I would return to the History Well once again.

Our congregation is kept up-to-date about the Presbyterian Community Center (PCC), its current programs, and the progress being made on replacing its facility. How the PCC began is a fascinating story.

In 1967, Montgomery Presbytery identified the southeast neighborhood of Roanoke as being "in crisis" due to the closing of the Viscose plant and cutbacks at Norfolk and Southern. Based on the study of the southeast neighborhood and the need for churches to consolidate their efforts to help, the PCC was established as a presbytery mission.

The ministry was intended from the get-go to be ecumenical in scope since the effort was to consolidate the resources of faith communities to meet needs while eliminating overlap (food, assistance, help with rent and utility bills). The first two directors of the PCC, Rev. Ted Edlich and Rev. Ben

Sparks, were hired by the Presbytery and served on presbytery staff. The official title each held was "Minister to the Inner City." Each had an office in a house that stood on what is today the church's Mountain Ave. parking lot. Second Presbyterian's senior minister, Dr. Hayden Hollingsworth, served as a mentor for these fresh-out-of-seminary ministers.

The effort was successful. The PCC's programs grew beyond meeting immediate needs to programs to build the community such as its Pathways for Youth program of tutoring and mentoring students in the neighborhood.

It also grew to the point where the presbytery entrusted its operation to a local board and separate incorporation. Roanoke area faith communities took on the responsibility for funding its operation and the ministry is no longer in a presbytery budget. Periodically, the question is raised as to whether it is feasible to keep "Presbyterian" in the title since its support is ecumenical. So far, the name has remained unchanged to honor the PCC's beginning as a Presbytery ministry.

The geographically small Montgomery Presbytery was long ago absorbed into the geographically large Presbytery of the Peaks. Today, most ministers and members within the Presbytery of the Peaks who live outside the Roanoke area are unaware of how successful has been a ministry that once began as an outreach of the presbytery. However, we Presbyterians in the Roanoke Valley can marvel in how God has used our congregations to create a growing ministry that is meeting needs and changing lives.

What Are THEY Doing Here?

WEDNESDAYS, MARCH 5, 12, 19 & 26 12:00 P.M. | FELLOWSHIP HALL

Some books in the Bible are about a specific person. What makes these stories so compelling is that they often center on individuals who live on the margins—people whose lives seem insignificant in the eyes of the powerful, yet matter deeply to God. These are the stories of God's powerful work among the powerless.

During the noon hour on March Wednesdays, The Bible in Black & White class will explore four of these narratives, seeking to understand what God sees in these individuals—and in all of us. Drs. Bill Lee and George Anderson, along with ministers from other sponsoring churches, will guide the discussion.



March 5: Ruth

• Two widowed Moabite women are a problem. It is the time of Judges and there are turf battles everywhere. With no one to protect or provide for them, Ruth and Naomi rely on and take care of each other. Why are they in the Bible?

March 12: Esther

• She's an immigrant married to Ahasuerus, the Persian king. He chose to marry her for her beauty. He did not know that she was of the same race as the people his most powerful advisor sought to expel from Persia. Why is she in the Bible?

March 19: Daniel

• The Jews are in Exile. Daniel is one of many who have been deported to Babylon. Like many Jews in Exile, he finds a way to be useful to those in power. Sometimes, though, he gets abused because of the offense of his race and beliefs. Why is he in the Bible?

March 26: Philemon

• The book of Philemon in the New Testament is a letter from Paul.

The letter is written to Philemon and concerns his slave, Onesimus.

Paul wants Philemon to accept Onesimus back and see him as a brother in Christ. So what? Why is this letter in the Bible?

Those who attend The Bible in Black & White are a unique community of people of different races and religious traditions. They gather to learn, but also gather to form relationships that promote healing within our community.

KAIROS: LENT 2025

The cyclical rhythm of the church year can be a welcome reminder of the passage of time and God's hand in it. Lent, like Advent, is a time of waiting and preparation. Only unlike Advent, we're waiting not for Jesus' arrival but for his death and resurrection. Generally, the season is a time of reflection and introspection as we evaluate our lives in the light of who Christ is and what he has called us to be. Many years ago, we named a Lenten practice of evening worship "Kairos." This ancient Greek word describes finding "the right or opportune moment." *Kairos* has been used over the centuries to describe time for spiritual reflection, and even, to put it simply, "God's time."

Again this spring, the church is offering a "blended" experience for Kairos Lenten worship, with opportunities for worship in person and online. God's time, really, can be any time. We pray that this Lenten practice may be welcome time of quiet, reflection, and connection to the Holy in the midst of this changing season.

Think, pray, and reflect through the stories of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection.



The Guerrants were married in 1965 at Windsor Hills United Methodist Church. Their shared faith and commitment to helping others have shaped their partnership both personally and professionally. In discussing Science, Evolution & Faith, Dick will discuss how science and religious philosophy are different, yet profoundly important to the other, and how survival traits and evolution itself are changing! He will challenge us to think about: 'who am I/we?' and 'where are we going?' from both our scientific and our faith perspectives.

Richard L. Guerrant, M.D. is the Thomas H. Hunter Professor Emeritus of International Medicine in the Division of Infectious Diseases and International Medicine at University of Virginia and is Founding Director of its Center for Global Health Equity, one of the first Trans-University Centers for Global Health. He was elected to the IOM/National Academy of Medicine and formerly chaired its Board on Global Health.
