### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We value faith formation for all ages and stages of life. Learning is a lifelong process, and it has been a joy to see the energy and engagement building in our educational programs at Second this past year. Midweek studies for adults explored the roles of women in the New Testament, took a deep dive into the book of Genesis, and engaged the works of C.S. Lewis and Marilynne Robinson. The Bible in Black & White continued to draw meaningful participation, and a special Advent adult Sunday school series examined the theology of Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol. Adult Sunday school participation was strong, and we even launched a new class to discuss scripture based on the Revised Common Lectionary cycle. We finished the year with four well-attended, year-long adult classes and two seasonal classes.

Evening Vacation Bible School in June explored the theme of joy even in our worst days, focusing on Paul's letter to the Philippians, and led by the Rev. Dr. Tom Are. Morning Vacation Bible School had children and volunteers alike learning more about Jesus' parables and their meaning for our lives today. The Trent Getaway retreat provided rest, learning, and relationship building for members of all generations. And the fall program year kicked off in August with a Rally Day Picnic at beautiful Braeloch Pavilion.

Under the leadership of Maria Blackshaw and many faithful volunteers, children's Sunday school provided creative and imaginative ways to help preschool and elemen-



tary aged children learn and love God's Story. Maria and Alison Conte continued to find creative, colorful, and musical ways for elementary aged children to encounter God's Word through fellowship and song at Kids' Fellowship on Sunday nights. Children, Worship, and Wonder added new volunteers, and helped our younger members encounter worship in special ways.

The unique Bible in Black & White class continued to evolve. For several years, a fall and spring series have been offered where clergy lead Black and White participants from around the community to reflect on scripture from different racial and cultural perspectives. The program is as much about community and relationship building as it is about study and reflection. The success of the class caught the attention of The Roanoke Rambler, and a nice article was written. There are now seven sponsoring churches; four predominately Black and three predominately White.

Our theme for the 2024-2025 Christian education year is "Deep and Wide." With the intelligence, imagination, and enthusiasm of our wonderful volunteers, we continue to dive deep and enjoy the gift of exploring God's Word in faithful community. I give deep thanks to everyone who makes our Christian education programs possible. From committee members to Sunday school and midweek volunteers, we are blessed to have a vital and vibrant program for all at Second Presbyterian Church.

### CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

Gratitude and excitement are sentiments the Congregational Life Committee heard regarding fellowship in 2024. We had many opportunities throughout the year for spiritual growth, fellowship, and relationship building. Meaningful time was shared amongst longtime and new members, both inside and outside the church walls.

Robin Hobbs and Mary Airheart continued to co-chair Food Services. Their leadership team secured menus, led discussions, and orchestrated the details that helped bring our meals and fellowship opportunities to life. The annual Christmas Dinner and Pageant is a cherished tradition at our church, attended by generations. This year, we had the largest turnout since the pandemic. Other meals that brought our congregation together in 2024 were the Pancake Breakfast, 80's and over luncheon, Trent Symposium Dinner, Evening VBS, and Rally Day Picnic. The team also provided snacks and drinks at Meet & Greet between worship services, and provided meals that fostered connection during events.

For the past two years, we've hosted a luncheon in April for congregation members aged 80 and over; 90 people attended in 2024. It's a time for fellowship with minimal programming, including singing and a brief message from Senior Minister George Anderson. The event has become a meaningful gathering for this group.

The annual Trent Symposium brought together eight newly ordained ministers from various states for five days of learning. On their final evening, we shared a congregational meal where we heard from speaker Ernie Thompson, became more deeply acquainted with the ministers, and enjoyed a lovely meal arranged by Food Services.

The Rally Day Picnic, organized by Maria Hammond, Shelley Lyons, and our committee, took place in late August at Braeloch Lodge in Vinton. The event included worship, music, a barbecue from Three Li'l Pigs with a sundae bar, a balloon artist, a face painter, and outdoor games. Over 300 people attended as we celebrated the end of summer and the start of a new Sunday school year.

Connie Polly, the Engagement Coordinator for our church, introduced us to new members and encouraged volunteers from our congregation to assist with events and activities. In September the staff launched Realm Connect, a digital church directory, and our committee assisted with photos before and after church services. This is an ongoing project with new features for the congregation to engage in to come.

Two seminars were offered in the fall: In October, the Central and Western Virginia Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association hosted a seminar on "Understanding Alzheimer's and Dementia." In November, the Carilion Center for Grief and Healing offered a workshop to help participants cope with the holidays and create a "soul collage." Both events were well attended and impactful.

Fellowship chairs Mia Copeland and Nancy Pickens helped with organizing church events. Insightful speakers were secured for each of our church retreats. 50 adults and 26 children attended the Trent Getaway at Eagle Eyrie Conference Center, with activities and worship coordinated by Donna Wardell and Chrissy Underwood, and Food Services handling snacks. During the Men's Retreat at Eagle Eyrie, Chris Vogado guided men through evolving

Congregational Care is a ministry that provides support and care to the members of our church, mostly beyond the church walls. It is an important area that falls under the Congregational Life Committee. There are countless volunteers who contribute their time to make these ministries come to life. Ministries that fall under Congregational Care include Second Family, Second Takes a Meal, Grief Team, Card Ministry, Visitation, and Flower Ministry. These ministries are how we care for our members in times of need and remind them that their church family loves them—whether they're homebound, grieving a loss, or progressing through later life.

Second Family hosts receptions with delicious food and allows a space for grieving families to meet with friends and loved ones while being supported by their church. Second Takes a Meal responds to needs of families and lightens their load by providing meals while members are recovering from illnesses, surgeries, or special circumstances. The Grief Team provides care and support to church members following the loss of a loved one. Within the first year of losing a loved one, the church office sends a series of books by Stephens Ministries to offer words of advice and support during different stages of grief, along with a letter from the pastoral team. The Card Ministry sends heartfelt cards to older members of the congregation on their birth-days.

One of the lesser known yet vital ministries of our church is visitation. The Visitation Committee provides outreach and hospitality to church members who are homebound or in need of additional support during an isolating illness or a challenging circumstance. Volunteers on the committee make personal visits on a regular basis to over 40 church members who can no longer attend worship services or participate in church activities as they once could. During the past year, these dedicated volunteers gave their time and energy delivering palms, poinsettias, cards, and gifts. Through these visits, meaningful friendships have developed, and our senior members have remained engaged in the life of Second.

On World Communion Sunday, October 6, Visitation Committee members were joined by 23 volunteers from the Session and College of Elders and served communion to those who cannot attend church. Many of our homebound members have shared how important participating in communion is to them and how grateful they are for this opportunity.

Every Sunday, church volunteers with the Flower Ministry deliver small vases of flowers—selected from the lovely floral arrangements donated for worship—to church members who are in the hospital, recovering from illness, have lost a loved one, or are homebound.

We want to thank all the volunteers who, quietly and without recognition, make a difference in the lives of our homebound, ill, and grieving members of our congregation. Our Congregational Care ministries are an important and impactful extension of the life and body of our church.

### **ENGAGEMENT**

My first year as Engagement Coordinator at Second has been a joy. I can't say enough about how much I enjoy meeting visitors and getting to know new and long-time members more. These conversations and relationships have enriched my love for the role and our congregation.

Live streaming remains a vital ministry for our church, serving as the first point of connection for many before they step through our doors. We hear from members who are homebound, ill, or traveling, all of whom rely on this service to stay con-

nected to worship and the community. It allows individuals to remain an integral part of our church family, no matter where they are. We regularly review our Virtual Friendship Pad, and are encouraged to see names familiar and new.

In 2024, we welcomed 38 new members of all generations—from confirmands (usually 8th grade) to senior adults, and everything in between. These individuals bring with them their many gifts, energy, and love for Christ's church. New member classes and opportunities for fellowship continue to help the pastors, members, and visitors get to know one another. Our new church management software, Realm, also helps us remain connected with visitors and new members. It has provided a much more organized way to keep track of contact information. We will continue to find ways to reach out to visitors and new members among us, as we extend the right hand of Christian fellowship and welcome them fully into this faithful community with love.

### YOUTH

### The Rev. Ben Brannan

The hope and goal of Youth Ministry here at Second Presbyterian Church is the transformation of lives through relationship with God and with one another. We believe that young people need opportunities for meaningful experiences of faith, authentic relationships with other youth and with adults, and the freedom to play joyfully together. This has been true through the ages here at Second, and in 2024, the youth continued to foster a safe and courageous space that allowed youth to lean into and be guided by the light of tradition as we seek new experiences for connection and growth!



Looking back over the special moments of faith our youth experienced last year, there is one word that continues to resonate: *presence*. January kicked off the year as we worked on Youth Sunday, a worship service that highlighted the gifts of our youth, and spoke to our 2023-2024 youth theme of *Fan the FLAME*. Here are some sermon excerpts from the preaching seniors of the Class of 2024—"each moment of faith has left an indelible mark on my journey... I am reminded of the profound impact small acts of kindness and shared experiences can have"; "We have the power to not only fan that flame but also let it shine the path of faith... Mindfulness invites us to be fully aware of God's presence in every moment and throughout our lives"; "Friendship has given me the ability to strengthen my relationship with God as I value the honesty and accountability of friends and of God"; "God has shown me that everything I need is inside me now, all I need to do is keep fanning the flame." Throughout the Spring semester, our youth focused on *acceptance, mindfulness*, and *evangelism* and the ways we are called to fan the flame of those things in our own life and the lives of others.

During our **2nd Annual Great Day of Service**—our youth-led, intergenerational service day for the church—we had over 30 adults, youth, children, and families join in fellowship and fun as we served with local agencies here in Roanoke. We prayed, served, worked hard, got a little dirty (ok, some got a lot dirty), and felt the Holy Spirit move through us and among us. We learned a great deal about our city, our partners, our ourselves, and God!

Our summer began with the DR Bibles & Bricks Youth Mission Trip to San Juan de la Manguana, where we helped lead a two-day Vacation Bible Study at two different churches. To learn more about this trip, I encourage you to read the blog posts by our youth and adult participants (<a href="https://www.spres.org/connect/blog/">https://www.spres.org/connect/blog/</a>).

We joined together to "run the race set before us" in mission right here in Roanoke for our 2nd annual three-day **At-Home Mini Mission Week**, when we provided landscaping services for Family Service of Roanoke Valley and Salvation Army Turning Point, and helped at the Presbyterian Community Center to restock their pantry and organize materials for their Pathways Program. Next, we headed to Montreat Youth Conference to join over 600 siblings in Christ from around the country in exploring our call to "plant peace." That week was filled with deep conversations and fruitful time together to play and grow. We ended the summer by volunteering at our very own Vacation Bible School here at Second, shepherding our young disciples through the "stories Jesus told" and telling our story—personal and collective stories of faith—at the Trent Getaway! What a summer!


We shifted into a new program year and a new program theme: **Deep Dive**. We began the 2024-2025 year with a cookout and a youth retreat, focusing on being intentional in the ways we "dive deep" into scripture, into relationships, into ourselves, and into service for the good of the world. The youth exemplified this "deep" intentionality as we welcomed almost 300 children and families for our **4th Annual Trunk or Treat**, which marked the beginning of our Middle School Hunger Busters Initiative, collecting food for the Presbyterian Community Center that totaled \$2,405.15—the biggest donation they received all year!

Last year was a year of love going out and love coming in—love of others and love of self, love in action and love in prayer. Thanks be to God!



### SUMMER PASTORAL INTERN

Through the generosity of the Kitty Susan Trent Fund, the summer of 2024 welcomed Second's fourth summer pastoral intern. It was a great joy to welcome Elizabeth Moore, a child of the church, to join in the work and mission of Second in a new capacity. Elizabeth was a leader in our youth program throughout her middle and high school years, serving on Youth Council as a vital member of the youth group and a leader to many. Elizabeth is in her third-year at the University of Virginia, pursuing a double major in biology and behavioral neuroscience with a minor in dance. Beyond her academic endeavors, she holds leadership roles as the Vice President of the Virginia Dance Committee and the Public Relations Vice President of Gamma Phi Beta sorority.



Elizabeth has a heart for youth and finds joy teaching, leading, and serving in positions that seek to develop resilience and compassion. Over the summer, Elizabeth brought her joy and enthusiasm, as well as her creativity, to all that she did: she assisted with Evening Vacation Bible School and the children's theater program; she visited members in their homes; she met with and learned from church staff about their various roles; she helped prepare for the youth Bibles & Bricks Mission Trip to the Dominican Republic; she assisted in devotions and leadership at Montreat Youth Conference, serving on the worship team; she led the art workshop and the energizers during Vacation Bible School; she helped lead the youth program at the Trent Getaway; and she delivered a beautiful Summer Capstone Sermon on the gift of science and faith together. Elizabeth continues to grow and learn and lean into God's calling on her life to use her gifts to love and serve!

Second Presbyterian Church also continues to live into God's call in being a "teaching church"! Through the internship, as well as the Trent Symposium, Edmund's Lectures, and Evening Vacation Bible School, Second Presbyterian Church has a heart for both teaching and learning. It is our prayer that we continue to foster and facilitate moments of deep and fun faith formation for years to come!

## YOUNG ADULTS

The Young Adult program here at Second continues to reform as we seek consistent opportunities to gather for study, fun, and fellowship. We had a big group of Young Adults and College Students gather for a great time at the Salem RedSox game in June! And throughout the fall, we met for Third Thursday Lunch in the City Market building. Our main goal for these luncheons was to connect as we break bread and check in, while our secondary goal was to envision the future of our Young Adult program. Young Adults want to be challenged, to be engaged in deep and meaningful conversations, and to find a place of warmth and welcome. Second Presbyterian Church is that place. Looking ahead, we will seek fellowship with other Young Adult programs to broaden our reach and our programing. Come find out how you might be involved in our Young Adult program.

## SERVICE AND OUTREACH

### Alice Holman, Committee Chair

In 2024, the Service and Outreach Committee focused on ongoing, forward-looking ways to deepen our calling to be a mission-minded church. The support of the congregation in these efforts has been extraordinary.

The congregation's pledged support is instrumental to our church providing consistent, planned aid to 24 local agencies, Solid Rock International, Beth-El Farmworker Ministry, Union Presbyterian Seminary, and the greater PC(USA) church. Your financial commitment is vital in helping these agencies meet their missions. On top of this pledged giving, the congregation responded to monthly Outreach Offerings by donating more than \$62,000 in additional support of ministries focused on food insecurity, at-risk children, people who are financially disadvantaged, the homeless, people who have mental health challenges, and isolated seniors.

Through the foresight and thoughtfulness of two families at Second Presbyterian, our church provides additional support to local agencies through funds these families established—the Lil Brown Fund and the Mountain Avenue Fund. In 2024, the Service and Outreach Committee recommended distributions of \$12,700 from the Lil Brown Fund to address mental health issues especially where they intersect with the poor. Additionally, the Service and Outreach Committee recommended the distribution of \$20,495 from the Mountain Avenue Fund in support of local ministries dealing with homelessness, poverty, hunger, and at-risk children. Continued contributions to these funds will allow Second Presbyterian to provide ongoing support in the future.

Beyond financial support, our congregation is in the community supporting those in need. Members provided meals for Kids Soar and Family Promise, provided a place for families of inmates to video conference loved ones through AFOI, and packed snacks for the Greene Memorial Summer Pack-a-Snack program for Highland Park and Morningside summer school students. The congregation volunteered as evening and overnight hosts for Family Promise at Alexa House, and members of the congregation also volunteered at the Rescue Mission, West End Center, Presbyterian Community Center, House of Bread, Bradley Free Clinic and the Local Office on Aging.

Additionally, our involvement with Congregations in Action supports class parties, tutors, Fun Day, and the Pack-a-Snack program at Highland Park Elementary. The Service and Outreach Committee supported Morningside Elementary in SE Roanoke by volunteering to help with their back- to-school cookout, STEM nights and purchasing hot chocolate supplies and serving about 300 attendees of the Winter Concert. We also supplied hot chocolate supplies for the 280 students to celebrate the winter break. We support the Pack-

a-Snack program at Morningside as well. The committee sponsored a collection of school supplies for both Highland Park and Morningside. Using money from our budget, the committee purchased 5 Thanksgiving bags, 5 gift bags for the Giving Tree, and 25 coats for Morningside. The committee, as part of the Congregations in Action, supplied 2 angel tree bags for Highland Park.

The Service and Outreach Committee also coordinated multiple collections throughout the year, including canned goods each month for the PCC food pantry, gift cards for the West End Center's angel bags, gift cards for Family Promise families, and Angel Tree gifts for seniors through LOA. We also donated Christmas cards and stamps to the Local Jail Ministry to be distributed to inmates in the local iails.

The Service and Outreach Committee is working to deepen relationships with the agencies we currently support and exploring ways to engage the congregation more actively. One way we have accomplished this is through a partnership with St. John's Episcopal Church to sponsor a home every 2 years with Habitat for Humanity. The "Partners in Prosperity" build took place in 2024, and Second Presbyterian committed to 16 workdays with Habitat for Humanity for the Mussa family from January through June. During that time, Second sent 156 volunteers for almost 810 volunteer hours. Your generous volunteerism for this project was amazing.

Looking forward, we will continue the monthly canned food collection for PCC. We will continue to support the affordable housing initiative through Restoration Housing's project at Trinity Commons (formerly Trinity United Methodist Church). This project will convert the 1922 Sunday School Building into 15 affordable rental units for low-income seniors and restore the 1903 Sanctuary for community gatherings. We will work in partnership with Loudon Avenue Christian Church to make healthcare more affordable through the Horizons Healthcare services through our support of the Patient Assistance Program.

Service and Outreach will sponsor a "mission fair" on March 30 during the Sunday school hour and following the 11:00 worship. This fair will allow the congregation to interact with representatives from the agencies we support and learn about the ways they can become more involved in their ministry.

The Service and Outreach Committee remains dedicated to focusing on ministries of compassion in our community. We are grateful for our congregation's continued support and commitment to acting as a mission-minded church.

### **PURPOSE**


The purpose of this report is to inform the congregation about the ways the Property Committee and Green Team are working together to 1) improve energy efficiency, 2) reduce the church's carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) emissions that contribute to global warming, and 3) advocate for the care of God's creation. The charts and graphs in this report are specific to the main church building located at 214 Mountain Ave. The Intersection, Alexa House, and parking lot lighting are not included. ### THE CHURCH'S ENERGY & EMISSIONS PROFILE

#### Types of Energy:

What types of energy does the church use to heat, ventilate, cool, light, and power its facilities?

The chart clearly demonstrates that electricity is overwhelmingly used by the church to heat, ventilate, cool, light, and power facilities. Therefore, it is important to focus on the church's use of electricity when addressing efficiency and  $CO_2$  emissions.



#### Sources of Electricity:

What are the sources of power used to generate electricity used by the church?

Electricity used by the church is predominately generated by the burning of coal and natural gas. This is important when it comes to quantifying the church's CO<sub>2</sub> emissions.



## Electrical Use in Kilowatt hours (kWh):

How much electricity does the church use annually?

As indicated by the chart, the church has steadily reduced its annual electrical (kWh) usage. The trend lower reflects efforts made by the Property Committee and Green Team to make the church more energy efficient. The good news is the church is using less electricity and emitting less CO<sub>2</sub>. The less than good news is that the


church is paying more because the cost of electricity continues rising. The increase in cost from 2023 to 2024 was 2.74% and rates are expected to go higher in the foreseeable future.

#### CO<sub>2</sub> Emissions:

How many tons of CO<sub>2</sub> are emitted annually based on the amount of electricity used by the church?

The chart shows the church's  $CO_2$  emissions trending lower. This is directly tied to its lower electricity (kWhs) use. As the church becomes more energy efficient and transitions to renewable energy sources,  $CO_2$  emissions will continue trending lower.

Note: A typical single-family home in the U.S. consumes about 12,000

kilowatt-hours (kWh) of electricity annually which is the equivalent of 12,000 pounds or 6 tons of  $CO_2$ . In 2024 the church emitted 355 tons of  $CO_2$ , or the equivalent of  $CO_2$  emitted by 59.16 homes.

### **ENERGY EFFICIENCY & SUSTAINABILITY**

Actions taken in 2023-2024 to make the church more energy efficient and sustainable.

- Completed a Phase I Energy Audit of the main church building
- Conducted a sustainability review of the Alexa House drawings and specifications
- Replaced all fluorescent tubes and incandescent bulbs with LEDs under APCo's rebate program
- Researched rooftop solar panels, shared solar, and renewable power purchase agreements

### **CARE OF GOD'S CREATION**

Christian Education opportunities offered by the Green Team to advocate for the care of God's creation.

- Hosted a fall semester Sunday School class called "Christianity and Climate Change."
- Hosted a spring Creation Care POP-UP Sunday School entitled "Loving All God's Creation."
- Created an Earth Day Worship Bulletin Insert for Earth Day Sunday Worship, April 21, 2024.
- Profiled Kyle Meyaard-Schaap's book Following Jesus in a Warming World: A Christian Call to Climate Action in the Sustainability Spotlight.

## SECOND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH PRESCHOOL

The Second Presbyterian Preschool program is a busy and thriving place. Our eight student classrooms are all full and children's voices can be heard from 8AM to 5:30PM daily. Children are encouraged to play in our faith-based programming which accepts children from 12 weeks old to four-years-old. Presently, the preschool includes an infant room, toddler room, young twos classroom, older twos classrooms, 3 three-year-old classrooms and a four-year-old classroom. The program not only provides a traditional half day "core" preschool program, but also offers wrap around care with options for early drop off, after care, and extracurricular activities for the older preschool children. These options provide parents with options for full time care of their children. Our preschool now offers 9 weeks of summer programming.

Our preschool is dedicated to providing enriching experiences for children and their families. Each year, the preschool hosts a variety of exciting daytime activities, including a petting zoo, Grandparent Tea, Nativity program, Muffins with Mom, and Donuts with Dad. In addition, we hold two special evening events for parents: Art Night in the fall and STEAM Night in the spring. These events offer a wonderful opportunity for parents to engage with their children and teachers through fun crafts and interactive projects. This year's Art Night had a Christmas theme, and every family left with a special keepsake to cherish.

The preschool has been blessed with an endowment fund, established in 2018, which has grown to a point where the Preschool Committee can begin using a small percentage of the interest each year to fund projects and programs. 



The Stewardship Committee is pleased to report an exceptionally strong response to this year's campaign, "Invest in Hope", which reflects the faithful commitment of our congregation to the mission and ministries of Second Presbyterian Church.

This year's campaign saw an 11.2% increase in the number of pledges received, with 307 households pledging their financial support. This represents the highest number of pledges in the past six years. The total amount pledged also reached an encouraging \$1,351,625, a 5.37% increase over last year and the largest pledged amount in the past six years. These increases demonstrate the congregation's dedication to ensuring that our church remains a vibrant and impactful community of faith.

We are especially grateful for the 42 new individuals/families who started pledging this year. This figure shows a positive increase from last year, and serves as a joyful reminder of the growing engagement within our church family. Additionally, 132 individuals increased their pledges over the previous year, continuing the positive trend of generosity and stewardship.

Another encouraging statistic is the significant decrease in the number of previous pledgers who did not renew their pledges this year, dropping to just 11—a dramatic improvement from the previous year's 39. This reflects a deepening commitment and sustained participation by many in our congregation.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to everyone who participated in this year's campaign. Your faithfulness and generosity enable Second Presbyterian to continue its support of staff, vital ministries and outreach programs, and provide a welcoming home for all who attend. Together, we are investing in hope and ensuring a bright future for our church community.




